Vestry Zoom Meeting Highlights - November, 2020

Althea Alton, Senior Warden, Reporting

Opening: The Vestry Meeting started at 11:32 am via Zoom

Attendance: Diane Hundley, Althea Alton, Charles Thompson, Meisha Davis, Preston Edwards, Marguerite Peebles, Rev. Stephanie Yancy, Rev. Sarah Woodard, Rev. Phillip Zoutendam. Deborah Deborg-Brown, Treasurer; Lew Myers, Finance Committee Chair; Willette Crews, Oral History Project Committee Chair.

Opening Prayer: Rev. Stephanie led the opening prayer.

Bible Study: Diane led a Bible Study, with vestry members volunteering to share their favorite scripture. She shared a Litany of Faith from a service honoring and featuring Bishop Desmond Tutu.

Minutes:

Rev. Stephanie had one correction to the minutes, which was to change the month August to September. The minutes were approved, with the modification, on a motion by Diane, with Althea seconding.

Oral History Project Report:

Willette Crews presented information on the oral history project. Currently, the committee is developing the scope and identifying resources for working toward engaging others. She discussed the project focus and how it impacts our community, which is to fight for equality. **Goal of Project:** To tell stories of people who are touching St. Titus' and the communities in which we live. To highlight those who have impacted lives of Durham and the world.

Sarah Woodard was thanked for her help in finding resources from Duke. The resource person has helped to share strategies for interviewing. Willette mentioned that an additional resource has been a book entitled: **African Americans of Durham and Orange Counties: An Oral History, by Jean Balduc.** The book relies heavily on Balduc's conversations with our own **Walter McMiller** and is dedicated to **Walter, Yvette, and Nettie.** The committee will soon provide a budget regarding the cost of the project, i.e. equipment and video needs. If there are suggestions or if vestry members want to assist, contact Willette. Rev. Stephanie thanked Willette for her project report.

Treasurer's Report: Deborah D. Brown

Highlighted specific areas: **Revenue for October** fell a bit short, however, she feels that November may be higher, based on current contributions
Summary, October Mission & Outreach, scholarship, salary and staff expenses: Total Income: \$11,091.63 Total Expenses: \$17,079.06 Net (\$5,987.43) Net YTD: \$271.89

Finance Committee Report

Lew Myers provided an introduction to his report of the 2021 Budget and indicated that it was an "All in Budget". He highlighted the inclusion of a line-item for a sabbatical for Rev. Stephanie and mentioned that Rev. she currently qualifies to take three months; the cost of six weeks has been included in the 2021 budget. In addition, monies for a 2% raise for Rev. Yancy and the associated cost with it have been placed in the budget. He cited that the budget is basically personnel driven. Rev. Stephanie mentioned that we may need a separate meeting to discuss the budget. Lew and Rev. Stephanie mentioned that the Diocese is not giving increases this year and Lew shared that Rev. Stephanie is underpaid based on her credentials. He stressed that we need to be competitive with our rector's salary. There is a Finance Committee meeting on the 2nd of December, which will allow the vestry to have a proposed 2021 Budget and recommendations by December 6th. Charles Thompson moved to approve the report and Althea seconded. The vestry approved the report.



Every Member Canvass Report

Althea indicated that the goal of the Every Member Canvass was to collect \$200,000. She shared that \$155,700 has been pledged by 41 persons as of November 15. Follow-up calls have been made to those who have not submitted pledges. Lew volunteered to assist with making calls to secure pledges. Diane Hudley moved to accept the report which was seconded by Meisha Davis. The vestry approved the report.

Rector's Report:

In the month since the last report, the Diocese made the decision to move back to Stage 1B of the coronavirus response. In Stage 1B indoor worship is not allowed. However individual congregations were allowed to continue to worship indoors if their county's COVID-19 metrics stayed below certain guidelines. Because Durham County has been within the guidelines, we continued to hold an 8:00 am service inside the church on Sundays. In recent weeks the service has been Holy Eucharist, for the first time since the beginning of March.

This week the Bishop announced that all churches must begin to operate under the Stage 1B restrictions, beginning Monday, November 16. My current plan is to continue to offer an outdoor service on Sundays at 8:00 am. As you can see, the situation is very fluid.

Some good news is that we have been able to resume Bible study. Philip has been leading an excellent series on the Psalms. The study is held via Zoom.

Vestry Zoom Meeting Highlights - November, 2020

Donna Smith continues to send packets to the parents of the youth who participated in Catechesis of the Good Shepherd. We don't know whether the parents actually do the activities with the children. We recently ordered Advent calendars for the children. Donna plans to deliver them in person as a way of checking in and to let them know St. Titus' is thinking of them.

I do want to note that the turnout was excellent for the Town Hall Meeting to discuss the survey results. More than 20 people participated last Sunday afternoon. That work is one of the ways we stay connected.

For Discussion

Because we are not able to meet in-person we will not be able to hold an official Annual Meeting in January. We can hold a virtual meeting however we cannot vote. Since we won't be able to vote we will not be able to elect new vestry members. We need to discuss how we will handle this. Three Vestry member's terms will expire in January; however, since we cannot elect new members she is requesting that the three members remain until March, if not the Vestry will have the responsibility of filling the spots.

My Work in the Diocese

In addition to the work I do in and for St. Titus' I also continue to be involved with activities that happen outside of St. Titus':

Serve on the board of the Johnson Service Corps (JSC). JSC is an affiliate of the Episcopal Service Corps and is a diverse, ecumenical community of young adults committed to social justice, spiritual growth, and community living in Chapel Hill and Durham.

Serve as co-chair of the Commission on Ministry for the Diaconate. This commission oversees the discernment and formation process for people who feel called to the vocational diaconate. Sarah is a vocational deacon. While it is my responsibility to ensure that the process is serving all involved, I feel a special responsibility to support people of color in the process. I have been told many times that in the past the Diocese has made it especially difficult for people of color to participate in the process.

Member of the Clergy of Color, a group in this diocese. Among the goals of the group is to contribute to the vitality and well-being of the remaining historically Black congregations in the diocese.

Serve on the Pastoral Response Team (PRT). Members of the PRT are selected by the bishop and are asked to provide pastoral care to members of the Diocese in sensitive situations, such as allegations of misconduct.

Preached this week for the **Anglican Episcopal House** at Duke Divinity School.

Wrote an Advent meditation for Durham Cares, a local non-profit whose mission is to foster collaboration, develop leaders, and educate the people of Durham to care for their neighbors in Holistic ways.

Charles moved to accept the report and Althea seconded the report. The report was approved by the Vestry.

Deacon's Report:

Deacon Sarah Mentioned the **Get-Out to-Vote** campaign and how well it went. It was GREAT!

Good News Garden – we have harvested greens and cilantro twice and shared this bounty with parishioners and our neighbors. This continues to be a good collaboration between St. Titus' and St. Luke's as well as with the community. Soon, we will expand the garden along the periphery of the fence adjacent to Delany House.

NCCU Campus Ministry – we continue to participate in Transformation Tuesdays on Zoom so that we will stay connected with the students and the Office of Spiritual Life and Development. This week, they discussed things for which they are thankful, including their faith. And, **St. Titus' participated in an outreach effort by donating food to send to Hondurans who have been affected by Hurricane Eta.** The students are flourishing in their studies as well as their faith journeys.

CC Spaulding responding to needs, we will **adopt three families for Christmas and purchase presents** or gift cards for them to enjoy. Details are forthcoming. Everyone will be notified about and encouraged to participate in this outreach effort. Partners Against Crime I participated in the District 4 Partners Against Crime Zoom led by Harold Chestnut and the Durham Sheriff's department

Continuing Education – Recently, I enjoyed another session on "Death and Dying" over Zoom with Bishop Gregg as facilitator.

El Buen Pastor Food Ministry- A group of Titusians engaged again this month in the food ministry at El Buen Pastor along with parishioners from St. Luke's and St. Michael's. We are grateful to the support from volunteers. Food was given to 150 people. We work hard and have fun serving

Rev. Stephanie thanked Sarah for all she does! Diane moved to accept the report, Preston seconded. The report was approved by the vestry.

Vestry Zoom Meeting Highlights - November, 2020

Curate's Report:

Phillip Zoutendam reported the following:

In preparation for Advent, he's putting together workshops on leading morning and evening prayers. He indicated that we may check the recordings, if we're not able to attend. Recordings will be available after each session. Charles moved to approve the report, Diane seconded. The report was approved by the Vestry.



Senior Warden's Report:

Althea reported that her emphasis has primarily been working with the communication with congregation and with the Diocese. She maintains the St. Titus Facebook Page. She has also been serving as Co-Chair of the Every Member Canvass and also serves on the Communications Committee. Marguerite Peebles moved to approve the report and Meisha Davis seconded. The vestry approved the report.

Junior Warden's Report:

Preston Edwards reported he will get with Lew to earmark maintenance items, as well as additional concerns. He stressed the need for us to be careful regarding our Public Health issues, especially with extended families, to avoid being exposed to COVID-19. Meisha Davis moved to approve the report and Althea seconded. The vestry approved the report.

Vision Mission Committee: The Town Hall meeting was well attended. Responses have been positive and people appear to really feel good about St. Titus' work as well as being included in the process.

Closing Prayer: Deacon Sarah said the closing prayer.

Adjournment: The meeting concluded at 1:11 pm.

Annual Meeting Postponed

We have been advised by the Diocese that parishes cannot hold **virtual Annual Meetings or virtual vestry elections**. **Both the Annual Meeting and any vestry elections must happen in person, not virtually.** We can hold Town Hall meetings on Zoom or some other platform, but we can't vote on anything unless and until we are able to meet in person. The three vestry members whose terms would expire at the 2021 Annual Meeting are **Lorie-Ann Lee, Preston Edwards, and Charles Thompson**. They have all agreed to continue serving through March of 2021, which is when the Diocese believes we will be able to meet in person. We will schedule the Annual Meeting once we have given permission to do so by the Diocese. In the meantime, we will likely hold some sort of online meeting in January or February in order to look back at 2020 and ahead to 2021. The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd

January 2021

Joyful Greetings to All,

During this horrific time of pandemic separation, our CGS ministry continues, though without in-person times together in our Atrium. To encourage and engage our children and their parents in acknowledging and welcoming our liturgical feast days and events, packets of “to do” materials have been mailed or delivered to them.

Pentecost

“Holy Spirit, come, make my eyes to see; make my ears to hear; make my mouth to speak; make my heart to sing and my hands to reach out and touch the world with your love.” Pentecost is a lengthy liturgical time, so the children received materials on how to celebrate its beginning and ideas on preparing a special prayer place or table. Attention was given to daily prayer suggestions, as home learning became the norm.

“See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God's children now...” (1 John 3:1-2a) We pray in thanksgiving to God for the gift of the saints, who teach us how to share God's love. The Feast Day of All Saints and then All Souls Day receive special recognition in our All Saints and All Souls Prayer service. Providing copies of this service and pictures with information about blessed Saints offer the children and parents a way to celebrate this essential Feast Day in our Church. Loving God, we thank you for uniting us in the Communion of Saints. Blessed be God forever.

Advent

“The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light.” (Isaiah 9:1) Advent affords a wonderful opportunity to suggest ways of “getting ready” for the Holy Day of Christmas. Each CGS family received a lovely Advent calendar to mark these days of preparation and anticipation. Plus, each was asked to participate in the lighting of the Advent wreath candles on a given Sunday at worship and did so. Truly a meaningful, liturgical gesture. Advent prophecy materials and the infancy narratives offered additional ways to express this sacred time. (Advent in our

Atrium is so very special and missing time together during this holy season was sadly disappointing.)

Epiphany is January 6, the 12th day of Christmas, and the visitation of the Magi to the baby Jesus and his mother (**Matthew 2: 1-12**). Epiphany materials, given to each CGS family, suggest ways to celebrate this momentous occasion when the Magi bring gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh to the Savior of the whole world. In our Atrium, we always pay great attention to celebrating Epiphany at our prayer table, which is dressed in the Magi gifts or Magi statutes, the Holy Family statutes, the Bible, Prophecy of the Star and Scepter scripture card (**Numbers 24:17**), and lighted Advent candles. **“He is the King of Kings; He is the Lord of Lords. His name is Jesus, Jesus, Jesus, Oh! He is the King.”** Together we sing, tell the Magi story, and pray.

With gladdened anticipation, 2021 indeed will be a new year when we can gather again in-person to enjoy and engage in learning about and celebrating being Christian.

In looking towards Lent (begins February 21); Holy Week (begins March 28); and Easter (April 4), our children and their families will continue to receive materials and suggestions on how to prepare for and celebrate our liturgical seasons and feast days, if our Atrium remains closed.

UPDATE The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd



The Meaning of Our Christian Epiphany

Epiphany means a sudden showing forth or the revealing of something what was previously hidden from human understanding or awareness. It is that “aha” moment when we realize something we had not known before –we see a new shining light - like a moment when the light bulb goes on over our heads and we see clearly.

Our Christian celebration of the Epiphany of the Wise Men or Magi is always celebrated on January 6, the 12th day after Christmas. These Magi were not kings but probably priests, scholars, keepers of sacred things, or astronomers. They may well have been Zoroastrian priests - astrologers who were literally “interpreters of the heavens.” Because they saw and followed the star of Bethlehem, we simply call them “wise men” out of respect for their extraordinary understanding and their deep devotion.

Once again God had spoken to his Creation, and these daring men responded by traveling afar to find the long-awaited Messiah - Jesus. Bringing precious gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh, they bowed in reverence to this infant Shepherd King who came to save the whole world.

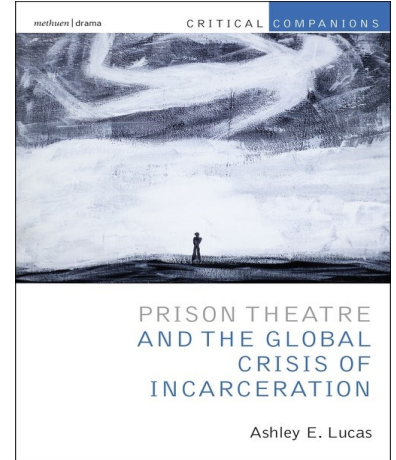
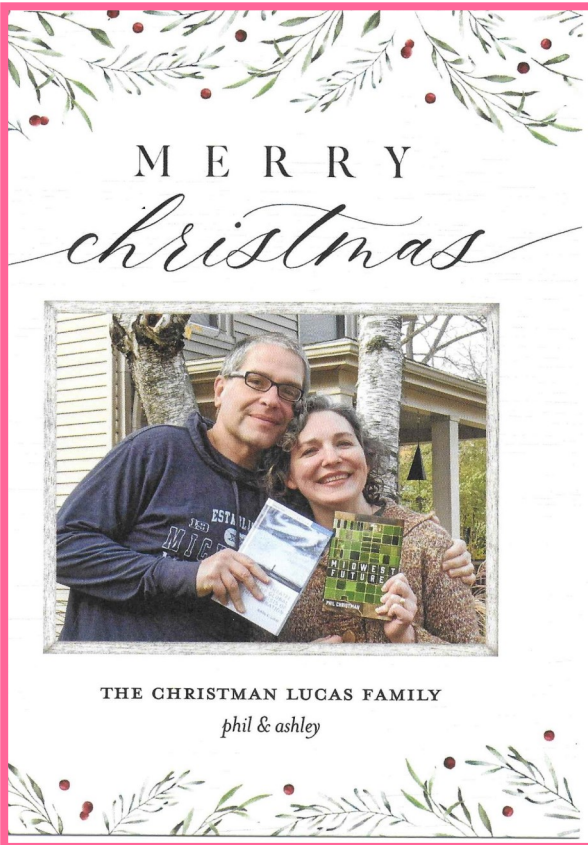
Gold- the Gift given by Melchior of Arabia, said to be the oldest of the Magi. **Frankincense** - the Gift given by Balthasar from Saba, which is present day Yemen. Frankincense is resin from the dried sap of the Boswellia tree - a tree that has grown on the craggy slopes of the Arabian Sea for thousands of years. In ancient times, Frankincense and Gold were equally precious. **Myrrh** - the Gift given by Caspar from southern Arabia. It was first used by the Egyptians in mummifying the Pharaohs and thought to be the key to immortal life. Both myrrh and frankincense are fragrant incense.

An Epiphany Celebration

- ❶ Prepare your prayer table or area with prayer cloth (white), Epiphany picture, Bible, Advent wreath with candles, * Prophecy card, or other chosen items representing Epiphany.
- ❷ Light candles & read the Prophecy of the Star & Scepter: Numbers 24:17 (* a scripture card for the prayer table) and the Visitation of the Magi: Matthew 2: 1-12.
- ❸ Response: “The promised One of God will be like a star - one who leads and guides.”
- ❹ Time of prayer: Read 2 Peter 1:19 - Response: “Lord, Jesus, shine in our hearts and minds.” Sing: “Bright morning star arising, bright morning star arising, bright morning star rising. Day’s a breaking in my soul.” Thank you, God, for coming as Jesus, the Savior of the world.
Alleluia, Amen.

Feeling inadequate. Stressed. Exhausted.

Many folks feel all the above during the holiday season from Thanksgiving to New Year's Day. Sadly, these are the terms many clergy persons use to describe themselves during the entire season of pandemic.

An article about this subject got my attention. Written by David Paulsen and published by the Episcopal News Service, it describes the stress, fatigue and instability that weigh down many a parish priest these days. Read the full article [here](#).

Here are three ways to be a blessing to those called by God to serve you:

Pray for your priest, every day. Pray for all aspects and challenges of their ministry as well their family and personal life, and their mental, emotional, spiritual and physical well-being.

Write notes of thanks and encouragement to your priest. An email may be fine, but there are so many of those to sift through these days. Heartfelt personal notes stand out and are generally treasured. You never know what a positive impact this may have on the day the note is received.

As much as possible, continue your financial commitment to your parish. The financial stress during the pandemic is weighing heavily on clergy leadership.

Multiply your blessing impact by doing the same for all members of your church staff whether paid or volunteer. And don't forget your Bishop and the diocesan staff.
