Gifts We Seek

The members of St Titus' have recently completed the process of gathering data from the congregation regarding leadership and the needs of the church. It appears that it is important for a leader, as well as the leadership team, to have a listening attitude, a transparent administration, an authentic personality, a spiritually God-centered approach, a willingness to reach out to the surrounding community, an interest in building the youth and developing young adult programs, and an open mind to new and innovative ideas. The perception pertaining to skills-based requirements should be obvious in the person's resume and documented based on their experiences. It is essential that a thorough vetting process is completed. Because St. Titus' is a unique and historically Black church, with a great tradition of acceptance, it is critical that the leaders have an appreciation for various cultures, particularly the black culture. The church has grown and has a diverse community, which is a blessing; however, it has been voiced that the church remains relevant and addresses issues that embrace the experiences and traditions of the church.

The Rector Search Committee met with Canon Massey and agreed to extend the end date for the St. Titus' profile to May 15th. All applicants will be sent by the Diocese to the committee for review on May 16th. While we are waiting, the committee will begin to compile a list of interview questions for our upcoming Zoom and in-person interviews.
