Wardens: Bishop, we have come together and have chosen and called Valerie Joan Mayo to be our Rector. We believe that she is well qualified, and that she has been prayerfully and lawfully selected. And, she has accepted. Bishop: I commend your choice and affirm this call.

The Bishop reads the Letter of Institution. The Bishop gives the Letter to the Rector. The Rector then says I, Valerie Joan Mayo, receive this letter from thy hands and recognize thine episcopal authority. I promise to be a faithful shepherd to thy flock, the Lord being my helper. The Bishop says Let us then offer our prayers to God for all his people, for this Congregation, and for Valerie, their Rector.

Bishops Share Bishops' Ball Update



April 3, 2024
Dear Beloved in Christ:

As this Easter season begins, we write to give you an update on our progress and next steps with respect to the incident that took place at this year's Bishops' Ball. **As promised when we shared the news in February**, we want to update you on the work that has been happening, that continues and will continue as we move through this process:

- Follow-up interviews were conducted last month with youth, families and youth leaders present at the event to ensure we had a full and accurate account of the incident. We received a report following those interviews; it has been shared with the youth leaders on our staff, and it will next be shared with the Racial Justice and Reconciliation Committee (RJRC). The report identifies necessary action items, and we are in the process of speaking with other experts in the wider church and youth leadership circles about additional changes they recommend.
- Our ongoing consultation with local youth leaders will include engaging them with a draft of our response to the report before it is issued.
- We continue to be in contact with the churches and the families of the children directly involved. We are in the process of setting up a follow-up meeting with the vestry of St. Titus', Durham, to address further the actions that they called for in their memo attached to our February 28 letter to you. We, the bishops, have also scheduled for mid-April a joint meeting with the Clergy of Color Caucus, the Coalition of Black Churches and the RJRC.
- Lastly, we are reviewing restorative justice approaches as a part of our steps toward justice, fairness and reconciliation. These will also be outlined in our report.

We expect to have this report ready for publication in mid-May. Events scheduled after that date and incorporating the changes called for in the report can be held as scheduled. This will allow us to hold HUGS Camp, scheduled for July. It will be the first diocesan youth event utilizing the new guidelines and protocols.

We thank you for your patience and continuing prayers as we move forward with this process.

Diocese Announces Plan for Funds from Sale of 200 West Morgan Street



Since the sale of Diocesan House at 200 West Morgan Street in September 2023, Bishop Sam Rodman and Bishop Jennifer Brooke-Davidson formed and have been working with a diocesan-wide task force to discern the appropriate use of the \$8.8 million net proceeds from the sale, currently held in an interest-bearing account. Together, with approval from our governing bodies, Diocesan Council, Standing Committee and Trustees, the task force has decided these funds will be used to support two areas: \$3.8 million to cover the lease and ongoing support of the new diocesan offices, and \$5 million to support new and existing projects and ministries relating to diocesan mission strategy priorities through grants, matching funds, seeding of projects and revolving loans.

"The work of our mission strategy and our journey to Becoming Beloved Community has always been about, first and foremost, the work happening in our churches and diocesan ministries," said Rodman. "As possibilities for the proceeds from the sale of Diocesan House were discussed, conversation returned again and again to the work happening within our churches."

The disbursement offering will be offered in three phases of approximately one year each.

➡ In the first phase, \$3 million dollars will be designated specifically for historically Black and Latino congregations, as well as churches with an annual operating budget of less than \$100,000.

The second phase will designate \$1 million dollars. Any church may apply for these funds, provided the proposed use is to fund works or projects done in collaboration, whether the partnerships are with Phase I-eligible churches, other Episcopal churches, community partners or other organizations. The only criteria is that the applying church be a church of the Diocese of North Carolina and a partner in the proposed mission strategy related work.

The third phase will offer the last \$1 million with no applicant restrictions
