In Loving Memory

Murphy Denell Jenkins, age 94 of 108 Conway Drive, Durham, North Carolina, died December

14, 2024.

Born in Baton Rouge, Louisiana on April 15, 1930, he was the eighth child of the late Sims F. Jenkins, Sr. and Mary Louise Giles Jenkins. After graduating from Mc. Kinley High School in Baton Rouge in 1947, he attended Xavier University in New Orleans, Louisiana, where he received the Bachelor of Science

(BS) degree in Pharmacy, in 1951. He received the Master of Science (MS) degree in Biological Science from Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey. He did further studies in the area of Biochemical Pharmacology at Purdue University, in Lafayette, Indiana. Murphy was a registered pharmacist in the state of Louisiana and served in the U.S. Army Medical Service Corps at the Percy Jones Army Hospital in Battle Creek, Michigan and at the 343rd General

Hospital in Japan. After an honorable discharge from the military, Murphy accepted a position as Assistant Professor of Pharmacology in the School of Pharmacy at Florida A&M University, in Tallahassee, Florida, finally serving as Associate Professor and Acting Dean until 1964.

Murphy was employed by the V.A. Hospital as a Research Chemist, where he co-published papers on DNA Polymerase. He retired from this agency in 1990 as the Sickle Cell counselor, a program that he started and spearheaded.

Murphy was married to the late Inez Tompkins. He was also preceded in death by their daughter Antoinette Rochell. He is survived by three grandchildren, Matthew of Durham, North Carolina, Amad of Miami, Florida, and Alrinez of Durham, North Carolina. He is also survived by nieces, nephews, and great-grandchildren.

Murphy was a member of St. Titus' Episcopal Church, where he served as a Lay Reader, Lay Eucharistic Minister, a member of the Vestry, Warden of the Columbarium, and an active member of the Brotherhood of St. Titus, among many other organizational roles. Murphy was a life member of the Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. and served as Polemarch of the Durham Alumni Chapter for one year. He held memberships in other organizations such as the American Pharmaceutical Association, the National Pharmaceutical Association, Chi Delta Mu, The Society of the Sigma Xi, Rho Chi, and the Saturday Nite Therapeutic Session Pinochle Card Club.






In Loving Memory

Today, we honor the extraordinary life of Father William E. Maddox III, a man whose journey was defined by faith, service, and dedication. He was called to heavenly service on December 8, 2024.

Born on January 31, 1944, in Bryn Mawr and raised in Darby, Pennsylvania, William "Billy" was the beloved son of the late William E. Maddox, Jr., and Dorothy Drakeford Newby Maddox. His early years shaped the foundation for a life of purpose and distinction. As a youth, he attended the historic Camp Atwater in North Brookfield, MA, where he made many lifelong friendships. After graduating from Darby High School, he pursued higher education at the University of Maryland Eastern Shore, where his leadership and commitment to excellence became evident. A proud and dedicated member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc., William embodied the fraternity's values of achievement and brotherhood. He went on to



graduate from the Philadelphia School of Divinity of the Episcopal Church (now part of the Episcopal Divinity School of Cambridge, MA) and furthered his studies at the University of Pennsylvania and Temple University.

Father Maddox was ordained to the priesthood in December 1970 at Saint Mary's Episcopal Church in Chester, Pennsylvania, by the Rt. Reverend Robert L. DeWitt, Bishop of the Diocese of Pennsylvania. Over the years, his ecclesiastical career reflected his deep commitment to spiritual leadership. He served as Priest-in-Charge of St. Mary's, Chester, Virginia, and St. Mary's, Bainbridge, Philadelphia; Curate at St. Augustine Church, Brooklyn, New York; Associate Priest at the historic African Episcopal Church of St. Thomas, Philadelphia; and Rector of St. Margaret's Church, Dayton, Ohio. Prior to coming to Durham as the fourth Rector of St. Titus' Episcopal Church, he served as Rector of St. Philip's Episcopal Church in Jacksonville, Florida. Alongside his work in the church, Father Maddox, inducted in 1979, he served an extraordinary 21 years of active duty as a Chaplain in the United States Army, rising to the rank of Major and ministering to countless soldiers around the world. His service brought him to an array of places, among them Monterey Ca, Stuttgart Germany, and Panama City, Panama. Most recently, he became a Canon of the Church in Ghana, Africa.

Father Maddox's unwavering faith and calling to the church were the cornerstones of his life. His integrity and compassion brought hope and inspiration to all he encountered. A proud and active member of the Elks, a 33rd degree Mason, and member of the Order of the Shrine, he worked tirelessly to support community initiatives and foster unity. He will be dearly missed by lingering friends across the world. Above all, he cherished his family, including his beloved wife of 47 years, Cleopatra Crawley Maddox, and their son, William E. Maddox IV. His legacy lives on in the countless lives he touched, and his memory will forever inspire those who knew and loved him. Let us honor his remarkable life by carrying forward his example of service, faith, and brotherhood. "Well done, good and faithful servant." – Matthew 25:23.






